

34th Week of Ordinary Time

Sunday is the Thirty-Fourth or Last Sunday in Ordinary Time and the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King. Jesus tells the marvelous parable about how we will all be judged - as a shepherd separates sheep from goats, based upon our care for the poor: 'Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of the least brothers of mine, you did for me'.

We celebrate the **Feast of Saint Andrew**, **Apostle** on the 30th.

Sunday Collection - November 19, 2023

The first reading this last week of the liturgical year is from the Book of Daniel. These apocalyptic and mystical readings were written to give encouragement to the Jewish people in the face of persecution.

The stories in the Gospel of Luke this week offer a look at the meaning of generosity as the poor widow offers her two small coins. Jesus cautions against those who will come in his name promising salvation: 'Do not follow them!' The cost of following his teaching is made clear, 'You will be hated by all because of my name, but not a hair on your head will be destroyed'. In a dramatic look at the end time, echoing the Daniel readings, Jesus says, 'And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory'. Jesus continues the 'end time' message saying, 'know that the Kingdom of God is near. Amen, I say to you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place'. He cautions, 'Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life, and that day catch you by surprise like a trap'.

Sunday is the beginning of a new liturgical year with the **First Sunday of Advent**. The first reading from the **Prophet Isaiah** as the people repent before God: 'Would that you might meet us doing right, that we were mindful of you in our ways!' **Mark's gospel** offers the image of the master who leaves his servants in charge while he is away. Be watchful! Be alert!

34th Ordinary Week - Daily Prayer This Week

The old and the new come together this week as we bring this liturgical year to a close and look ahead to Advent, which begins Sunday. We reflect that Jesus is our Savior and King. This means we are called to help build up the kingdom by loving Jesus in our poorest brothers and sisters. We will encounter readings about the generosity of a poor widow and the warning of the approaching end of time. This is meant to help us begin our preparations for Advent. The actual end of the world may not be at hand, but the Kingdom of God is always at hand for us. It takes focus and paying attention to notice the signs, the ways the Lord makes himself available to us in the midst of our busy days.

We prepare for Advent this week when we can begin a small, but honest prayer, 'Come, Lord, Jesus. Come into this place and into the conflict in my life. Let me be attentive and open to see the places where I am restless, distracted and too busy. Come into my real situation - not the way I present myself to others. Come to me - the real me that needs you'. We need this kind of preparation. These are challenging times. Holidays stretch us and test us. Sometimes, under the stress of it all, we regress into behaviors that are bad and destructive, because they are familiar and what so many others are doing. Relationships get strained. Alcohol rarely brings cheer without at times risking bad patterns. So, praying these days - while very busy - praying out of our needs and even our pain - roots us in relationship with the One who always comes to save us.

For all of us, this is a week to be grateful and to experience the beginning of Advent on Sunday. We can prepare to walk into Church more alert, more ready to explore our longing. As we grow in our practice of connecting with our Lord and friend in brief moments throughout each day, we can develop the habit of giving thanks each night for what we have received.



34th Ordinary Week

The readings invite us back to the simplicity of the pasture where the sheep and goats are being gathered in and separated for sending to different pastures, or to their life's completion as meat.

At another level we might experience with St. Ignatius of Loyola the "Call of the King" that comes to us once we recognize that we are not God (even if sin led us to try to be our own self-creation) but that we are utterly loved by a God who desires us to share Trinitarian life and love.

The meditation on the Call of the King is a prayer exercise that falls between the first and second weeks of the Spiritual Exercises that Ignatius experienced and gave to the Church. The Exercises describe a series of graces that are given by God as the one praying through them is open to the graces. After discovering and rejecting the patterns of sin attendant on one's story, God may grant each of us the grace to become a companion with Jesus in his mission. This is the call of Baptismal surrender. To become a companion of (or bread breaker with) the Lord of heaven and earth.

Today's feast invites us to recognize the task and the glory that this implies. Christ the King is most clearly seen as the one who lays down his life on the cross for the salvation of all from the slavery of sin. His glory is also seen in his shepherding work of care for the vulnerable, in his invitation at the death of each person to come home, and his judgement of the nations for their cooperation with His work of bringing joy, peace, freedom and health to every human being as brothers and sisters, not as inferiors or slaves.

As we complete this Liturgical Year of grace and begin the new one with the Advent yearning to be close to Jesus and his saving grace, we are called by him to collaboration with Him in His saving work. As we look back on the year past have we grown more into companionship with Jesus? As we look forward to the coming weeks and months do we want that companionship to expand and grow?

Today is the day to hear his invitation in the state of the world, as well as in the gifts He has given each of us. The invitation is ever to be part of His mighty work of bringing all humanity to freedom, peace, delight and companionship at the banquet of God's glory and all of creation to its fullest purpose.

I want to hear that call this late November day and I want all persons to hear that call and respond with a thrilling shout of yes. Will you join in the throng going to the Mountain of the Lord by fully accepting the call of the King.
